Pathways to Education and Work Research Group





Transition Systems

Dominant Education Logic

Links between education and work are relatively loose aside from regulated occupations

Emphasis on general education

Qualifications are used as a screen for entry to the labour market



Roles of Qualifications

Screen Signal


